Pennsylvania Golden Owl Award

Agricultural educators are a different breed of teachers. They teach, mentor and inspire thousands of kids to be the best they can be across the country. These individuals help students unlock their potential and give them skills that can be used in the agricultural industry and beyond. Agricultural educators also serve as FFA advisers to give students opportunities for years to come.

Being an agricultural educator brings along early mornings, long nights and constant change to adapt to an ever-changing industry.

Being an agricultural educator takes heart and soul that few other jobs demand. Ag Educators don't always get the recognition they deserve. Presented by Nationwide, the Pennsylvania FFA and the Pennsylvania Farm Bureau, the Golden Owl Award helps to fix this problem and make sure they are recognized for all their achievements by their students and their colleagues.

The Golden Owl Award is presented to four educators across the state, one of which will be chosen as agricultural educator of the year. Those selected as regional winners for the award will receive \$500 along with an engraved plaque. The honoree selected as the state winner will receive \$3,000. To be selected to receive the award, an agricultural educator must be nominated by a student, fellow teacher, and or supporter.
