FFA Draws 'ACES' to Harrisburg

Each February the Pennsylvania FFA Association hosts its largest conference of the year. Agriculture Cooperation Establishes Success, or ACES, is a two-day conference held over the first three weekends of the month. Approximately 1,500 students and advisers attend the event series. Both students and advisers enjoy leadership workshops, guest speakers and the making of lifelong memories during their time at the Sheraton Hotel in Harrisburg.

Throughout the first day of the conference, students rotate through five workshops. The topics of the workshops were agriculture literacy, FFA opportunity, and respecting diversity and were taught by the current state officer team — Nathan Moyer, Thomas Gabel, Taylor Halbleib, Philip Winklosky, Brody Coolidge, Justin Kurtz, and Kelsey Stewart, as well as past state officers Jill Palmer, Tyler Watkins, Libby Baker-Mikesell, Elizabeth Win-

In addition, two workshops were taught by AgChoice Farm Credit and Pennsylvania Farm Bureau on financial skills and life after FFA. In the evening, Agriculture Secretary Russell Redding, Deputy Secretary Gregory Hostetter, and Deputy Secretary Fred Strathmeyer and Emily Thorpe with the Chesapeake Bay Foundation shared a few words with the students during dinner. In the morning, the students completed a community service project plan before departure.

This year, the conference theme was Creating the Vision. While planning ACES, this year's Pennsylvania FFA state officers wanted the members in attendance to take what they learned at the conference and use it to build their own "vision" of life inside and outside of FFA. By attending ACES, the members are able to apply what they learned at school and in their everyday interactions.

Sharing the FFA Story in the Sunshine State

In late January, state officers Thomas Gabel and Justin Kurtz were on their way to Orlando, Florida, for the New Holland North America Dealer Meeting.

At a roundtable discussion with the nearly 1,000 people in attendance, Gabel and Kurtz had the chance meet New Holland dealers all over the country, representing young agriculturists and FFA members.

To open up the discussion, both officers gave opening remarks on their subjects. Gabel spoke on how to bridge the gap between young people and New Holland after Kurtz spoke on how to get more young people into production agriculture. Once finished with remarks, they took audience questions from a text delivery system. Questions included "How do we use new technology in agriculture?" and "How to get FFA members excited about the variety of careers in agriculture?"
