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Pennsylvania Represented at State Officer Summit

On July 22, the National FFA kicked off its first ever State Officer Summit, replacing the State Presidents Conference traditionally open to only two officers representing each state.

While there, the team participated in workshops and discussions facilitated by National FFA which taught them how to advocate for themselves, their communities and their states. Tours of Washington D.C. included stops at the Lincoln Memorial, Washington Monument, and even a tour of the Executive Office, just a short walk from the White House.

The team spent time on the hill, meeting with congressmen to advocate for House Bill 5595, an amendment to the National FFA charter which allows the National FFA Organization to become more of a self-governing body. Pennsylvania's state officers were able to meet with U.S. Rep. Glenn Thompson who introduced the bill and has been a long-time supporter of Pennsylvania FFA.

During the end of the week, State President Jenna Harnish and Vice President Jacob Kinzer served as Pennsylvania's representatives to the delegate session, a process that reviews the delegate issues that will be debated and voted upon at the National FFA convention in Indianapolis this October.

Old Becomes New With Restoration Project

The East Juniata FFA chapter in McAlisterville, Pennsylvania, has begun a unique and interesting tradition by transforming an old, unusable manure spreader into a rustic and patriotic parade float. The manure spreader was originally brought in to teach an ag mechanics class how to weld but after some inspiration from the students the spreader quickly turned into an iconic float that the East Juniata FFA chapter is depended on to bring to the local parades.

The main theme for the parade float, "FFA in the USA," is very apparent with strings of miniature flags draped over the sides, American flags standing in the back, and the students wearing red, white, and blue shirts. On the sides of the parade float agricultural quotes, FFA emblems and American flags, all hand carved with Dremel tools, are on full display to showcase the students' hard work. The quotes on the side of the float are from great supporters of agriculture such as Thomas Jefferson, George Washington, John F. Kennedy and Paul Harvey.

The National FFA theme from last year, "I Can, We Will" is captured on the front of the float and describes the sense of community found in the East Juniata FFA Chapter. The quote on the back of the float says "We Can, We Have for 90 Years," and with projects like this, the chapter will continue to grow

This year the East Juniata FFA chapter placed second in the Fayette Carnival Parade, and are looking to do several other parades in the upcoming year. This parade float is a fun and competitive way for the members of the chapter to showcase their talents and grow as a chapter through spreading the importance of the FFA and agricultural education.

"Jenna Harnish of the Athens FFA Chapter" — before I knew it I was running faster than I have since my track days alongside of the retiring president, Nathan Moyer. I climbed the steps of the large stage and ran into the arms of a random group of fellow members who were now my teammates. These fellow members would soon grow to become some of my dearest friends.

As I reflect upon the last sixty days of my time in office, I often find myself going back to the values I have learned growing up in the rural farming community of Bradford County. The goal for myself during the year is to take in the experiences and knowledge of a variety of proud Pennsylvania agricultural industries. The goal for my role is to understand the importance of "Association" on the back of my jacket as I provide continuous encouragement and support to each member.

If I did not have that support, I would not be blessed with the position I am in. If members do not have the encouragement, they will never be fully aware of all that they can accomplish — even if they do not know it yet.
