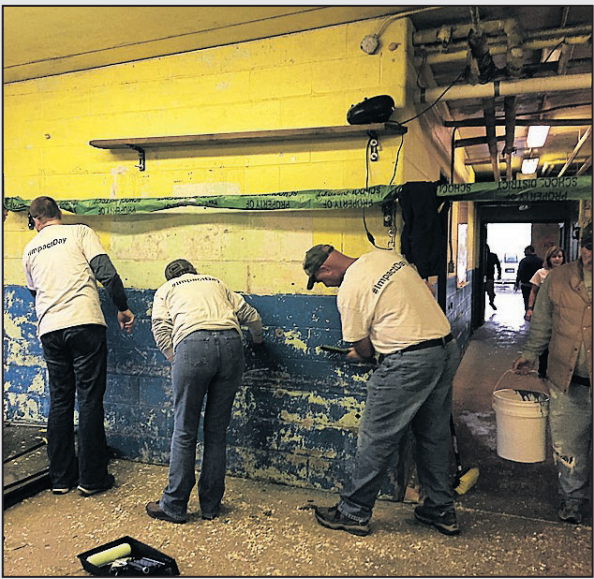
"This year has flown by, and I am so grateful for all of the lessons learned and relationships I have made. Thank you,
