

HARRISBURG, Pa. — On April 28, the Pennsylvania FFA state officers paired up with the Pennsylvania Landscape and Nursery Association (PLNA) to deliver red oiser dogwoods donated by Octoraro Nursery to the state representatives in Harrisburg in celebration of Earth Day and Arbor Day. The state officers met up with PLNA President Cathy Corrigan on April 25 to get more then 250 trees bagged, labeled and ready for their delivery to the capitol building the following Monday.

The state officers went onto the House floor in the state capitol and placed trees on each representative's desk on April 28. When each representative had a tree on his or her desk, the remaining trees were delivered to each of the senator's offices.

After walking through every hallway of the capital and seeing the House floor, the state officers successfully delivered 264 red oiser dogwoods to every member of the General Assembly.

Before leaving the capitol, the team also delivered trees to Gov. Tom Corbett and Lt. Gov. Jim Cawley and their staff.
