\$20 in labor costs, which is about 120 meals that can be distributed to those in need. With the 44 volunteers that day who worked about 3.5 hours, our impact on the community is over 18,000

Cedar Crest FFA Receives \$2,500 Donation

LEBANON, Pa — Each year the Monsanto Fund provides several grants to help improve the communities in which agriculturalists live and work. One of these grants is the America's Farmers: Grow Communities grant. This grant allows farmers to enter to win a \$2,500 donation for a community nonprofit organization of their choosing. One winner is selected per eligible county.

Thanks to Wen-Crest Farms, the Cedar Crest FFA chapter has received one of these \$2,500 grants. Wen-Crest Farms is a third generation farm that is owned and operated by the Wenger Family. Steven Wenger graduated from Cedar Crest High School in 1982 and was a member of the Cedar Crest FFA. His son Nick is in the Cedar Crest FFA and serves as the chapter reporter. Steven Wenger and his wife Bonnie also have two other sons, Brad and Brandon, who are also Cedar Crest FFA

The Cedar Crest FFA will recieve the grant at their FFA Banquet on March 21. A representative from the Monsanto Company and the Wenger family will be present at the banquet to present the check.
