Ag Awareness Food For All

In an effort to raise awareness of agriculture’s impact and the importance of locally grown food in Cumberland County, the Cumberland Valley FFA is hosting its First Annual “A-Day” for Agriculture Awareness Food For All... From Farm to Fork, which is slated for May 25.

The highlight of this event will be the ground breaking of a 6-acre community hunger garden and agricultural learning center on the campus of the Cumberland Valley Educational Park.

The vast portion of foods grown will be donated directly to charities like Project SHARE and the Central Pennsylvania Food Bank. Hopefully, the remaining food can be sold by forming a partnership with local food merchants in order to provide venues of fresh, student-produced, Pennsylvania Preferred agricultural commodities that can benefit and be enjoyed by thousands in our community. Income generated by these partnerships will be used for the future growth of the garden so that we can better serve local hunger needs.

In turn, the garden will provide

learning opportunities for all areas of curricula at Cumberland Valley—and beyond. Agriculture students will be able to hone a wide variety of agriscience skills. Biology classes will have the opportunity to study native species of Pennsylvania trees, shrubs and plants in the arboretum. Math classes will be able to calculate the average crop yields. English students will promote literacy through outdoor learning labs. Chemistry students will determine proper soil nutrient balances. Special needs students will engage all of their senses through a fully accessible garden and landscape. All of

these students will be able to share what they’ve learned by working to incorporate educational centers and stations into the larger garden.
