ATHENS, Pa. — On March 19th the Athens FFA dairy judging team traveled to Penn State to compete in Penn State's annual youth dairy judging contest. Teams from all over the state competed.

The Athens team, consisting of Bruce Learn, Nick Insinga, Mason Tate and Elliot Elsbree, placed first in the team division.

For the event, contestants had to judge six classes of Holsteins. The Holstein classes were different age groups ranging from yearling heifers to four-year-old cows. Oral rea-

sons were also presented on selected classes.

In the individual competition, Nick Insinga was the high individual overall. Elliot Elsbree had the highest reasons score.

The FFA team and the Bradford County 4-H Dairy judging team hosted practices as local farms since December in preparation for the March contest.
