Those were the words of students from across Pennsylvania FFA as they experienced the State Legislative Leadership Conference (SLLC). Nearly 400 members and advisers gathered in Grantville, Pa.

earlier this week to experience leadership at a whole new level.

FFA members arrived excited and ready to take on the challenge learning and experiencing Pennsylvania legislation on Sunday afternoon. First, they sharpened their skills on various workshops and became professionals in parliamentary procedure, etiquette, and the legislative process. Then they split into the House and Senate, then majority and minority, and put the skills learned in the workshops to work

by making amendments to bills. In committees students discussed one of three house bills, and one of three senate bills. After making various amendments within their committees, they held a caucus meeting and the general assembly. Finally the two houses switched bills for one more look at Pennsylvania legislation.

Once learning the value of success within a challenge, the students were put to the test. Monday afternoon every student spent three hours

giving back to the community by participating in community service. One student mentioned, "It's about the feeling you get when helping others, and making a difference in a community." Our students went to various locations around the area to complete tasks such as landscaping, picking up trash, making mats for the homeless, packaging items to help those in need and various others activities.

Of course the conference ended with the opportunity to meet with

legislators and special guests. The state officer team conducted a legislative breakfast and recognized several extraordinary individuals. Upon adjourning the conference students gathered on the capitol steps to take a photograph. Then they took off from steps into the capital for tours and meetings with their senators and representatives. This week during SLLC, Pennsylvania FFA members took some amazing opportunities and created the ultimate Legislative and leadership experience.
