

A.C.E.S. Conference Puts "FFA Under Construction"

After the State Officers conducted opening ceremonies on Saturday, the members attended workshops to learn about "Subcontracting Your Future" (the FFA Foundation and FFA Alumni), got "A Fresh Coat of Paint" while they worked on a community service project, figured out "What's in Your Toolbox' as they explored ways to increase chapter involvement and take advantage of opportunities within the FFA, visited the "Renovation Station" to work on goal setting and

continuous improvement, and took care to make their efforts "Constructive Construction" by improving problem solving and communication skills. After a delicious supper (a great A.C.E.S. tradition), members met up at the "Construction Crew Gathering" where they could dance to the latest hits and the classics, play games, or view a slide show of pictures from various FFA events through out the past year.

Before the evening drew to a close, the State Officers presented reflections on the parts of the FFA emblem and constructed the emblem while they spoke to the group. " . . . every piece of the emblem could stand on its own, each representing something unique and different, but it is when we put them together that they form something bigger, better, and stronger.

. ." said Kristie Folk, state vice president of the northern region during her part of reflections. Cale Grimes, state treasurer, reminded the members that they are each an essential part of the FFA.

The members turned in for a short night of sleep before reassembling for a time of inspiration before breakfast on Sunday morning. Gary Swann from the Pennsylvania Farm Bureau joined the members for breakfast and shared some of his thoughts and experiences from his time in the FFA and as the 39th National FFA President. Swann reminded the FFA members that leadership is not just about congratulating the winners - leadership is just as much about talking to those who did not finish in first, commending them on their efforts, and encouraging them to keep trying. By the end of the A.C.E.S. conference, Pennsylvania FFA members may have been exhausted, but they headed for home with new tools, information, and possibly even some renovation plans to take back to their home chapters.
