Attention Emergency Workers, FFA Members and Farmers

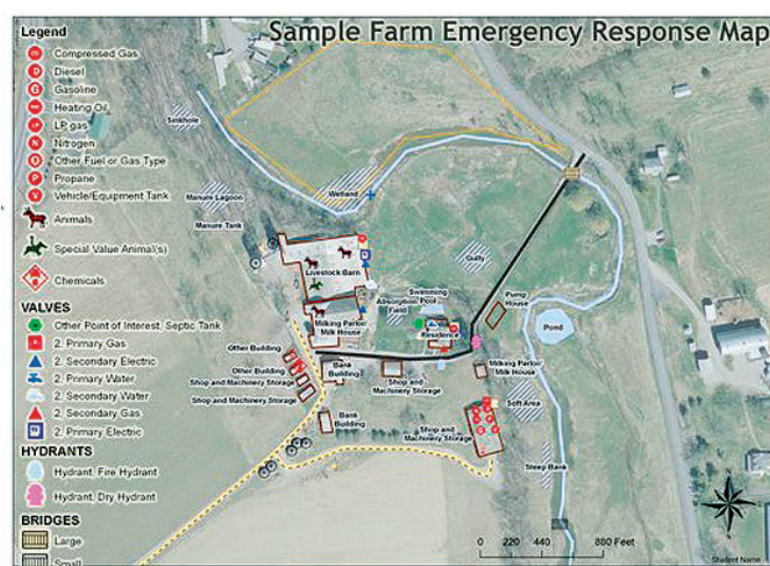

EVERYWHERE, Pa. — FFA members all across Pennsylvania are pitching in to do their part in saving farms.

The Pennsylvania FFA S.A.F.E. program, or Saving Area Farms Effectively, started as an idea over four years ago and maps are now being made and posted on the farms.

The purpose of S.A.F.E. is to map out the farmer's land and then have a Farm Emergency Response Map on site so that if anything should happen, emergency medical teams and firefighters can see the layout of the land. The Farm Emergency Response Map contains information about hazards and important assets that emergency response personnel need to know in the event of an emergency, such as fuel storage locations, gas shutoffs, chemical storage sites, septic systems and more.

This program helps FFA students complete a valuable learning experience because they get to use computerized geospatial

mapping technologies. It also protects the health and safety of local emergency responders and reduces economic and financial losses.

FFA S.A.F.E. is supported by a variety of agricultural organizations including Penn State College of Agricultural Sciences as well as Pennsylvania agricultural organizations, agribusinesses and emergency responder

groups. A curriculum has been made to teach farm mapping as a part of school curriculum which ties in math, English and science standards.
