Lebanon County CTC FFA

When arriving at the Lebanon County Career and Technology Center, the class as a whole had no idea that we even had a chance of being part of FFA.

After a few weeks, our adviser had discovered that the landscape technology course was an agriculture-certified class, which meant we could start our own FFA chapter.

It was then discovered that a dormant FFA chapter had existed over two decades ago. After starting the chapter with no funds, we started to get school administrators involved, which gave us a huge boost with getting our new banner and entering us in local career development events.

In the Lebanon County competitions we competed in ag mechanics and landscape/nursery. Even with our limited experience, time and preparation, two of our members placed very high in the landscape/ nursery, and another placed fourth in ag mechanics.

Our next challenge was participating in the Pennsylvania Farm Show. The first project that came to mind was the landscape design competition, where we excelled at designing, hardscaping, and detail work. We won third overall and received the award for best nonliving material.

Our adviser proposed the idea for two of our members to participate in the log splitter competition at the Farm Show so they could gain handson experience in their interests.

The two members did a lot of material repurposing in this project by collecting scrap metal, incorporating wheels off a '40s Jeep, integrating a hydraulic piston from a '70s Ford garbage truck, and creating a hydraulic reservoir from an antique gas can.

They created a record book, video and presentation, which they had to present at the Farm Show. The members finished first overall along with best video, best presentation and most creative log splitter design. A few members also competed in mini landscape designs and floral designs.
